#### **Summary:**

This lesson is offered in two parts: Preserving Historic Buildings and Preserving Family Stories.

#### **Preserving Historic Buildings**

Using the Unit on Preserving the Past, read and learn about how to research and describe a historic building. Then, select a building that you may act like a "preservationist" would by documenting the history of the building. To get started, locate a building that interests you. This could be your home, the public library, city hall, or something else. The worksheets will guide you through your research on the building you choose. If you are visiting the Republic of the Rio Grande Museum you can conduct your research on that building with the worksheets included.

#### **Preserving Family Stories**

Again you will use the Preserving the Past Unit as a way to become familiar with how preservationists do their work to record history. You will again do some research, this time by talking to your family and gathering photos to save as records of the past. You will then write a letter to yourself in the future. You can record what your life is like, and save it as a record of your own history.


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# PRESERVING HISTORIC BUILDINGS

Keeping records of old buildings is a way to document their histories and to help save the historic elements of a community. Architectural Preservationists are people that do this type of work.

Imagine you are an Architectural Preservationist and you are looking to record details of a building. In this case, you will record the details of the historic building that the Republic of the Rio Grande Museum is in. While visiting the building be prepared to look at it from the outside and the inside. Look closely for details. Note things that are unusual or unexpected.

After you are done researching the museum's building select another building you would like to study. This could be your home, your church, library, city hall or something else. This project will be a little harder than researching the museum as you will be on your own to gather whatever information you can.



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
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
## PRESERVING FAMILY STORIES
